

Naloxone (also known as Narcan or ReVive) is a **safe medicine used to treat opioid overdoses**. You can get naloxone in **three ways**: through community-based organizations, from pharmacists, and over-the-counter (OTC starting in Fall 2023). [The Good Samaritan Law provides certain legal protections when administering naloxone to someone who is overdosing, whether you have drugs on you or not.](#)

Intranasal spray & vial for injection



No identifiable patient information on package or label.

- Recovery community centers
- Outreach organizations (home delivery and drop-in)
- Health departments
- Syringe service programs
- Community naloxone distribution programs
- Vending machines (locations vary)

## PHARMACIES

**Covered by insurance**

*Copays range from \$0-\$50, Health Savings/Flexible Spending Account may cover co-pay. Medicaid copay \$0.*



Intranasal spray & vial for injection



Patient Information required for insurance. Product includes a label with patient name.

- Request from local pharmacist
- Can receive it with or without a prescription.
- Often available through home delivery and pharmacy drive-thrus.

## OVER-THE-COUNTER

**Retail Price ~\$40-50**

*Insurance may cover with copays of \$0 or higher, Health Savings/Flexible Spending Account may cover. Check with your insurance, provider, or pharmacist.*



Intranasal spray

Can obtain anonymously. No label, no identifiable information.

- Anyone can purchase the product from the shelves in pharmacies and other retailers, in store and online.
